- ☼ A 20% deposit is required to confirm your order. Payment on collection of plants can be made by cash, direct debit or cheque.
- ☼ Plants will be ready autumn 2017 onwards. You will be notified when plants are ready for collection.

Number Request	Latin Name	Common Name	Comments
	<i>Acacia dealbata</i>	Silver Wattle	Fast growing, excellent for habitat and erosion control. Suckers.
	<i>Acacia implexa</i>	Lightwood Wattle	Tough and long lived. Good for shade, shelter and gully erosion.
	<i>Acacia mearnsii</i>	Black Wattle	Excellent habitat. Fast growing. Can sucker after disturbance.
	<i>Acacia melanoxylon</i>	Blackwood Wattle	Useful in riparian plantings. Wind/fire breaks and erosion control.
	<i>Allocasuarina leuhmannii</i>	Buloke	Long lived and nitrogen fixing. Sensitive to fire and grazing damage.
	<i>Allocasuarina littoralis</i>	Black She-oak	Long lived. Good for habitat and shelterbelts.
	<i>Allocasuarina verticillata</i>	Drooping She-oak	Long lived. Tolerates strong winds. Good for habitat and shelterbelts.
	** <i>Banksia marginata</i>	Silver Banksia	Large shrub or small tree for shelter and habitat. Good nectar producer.
	** <i>Brachychiton populneus</i>	Kurrajong	Cylindrical or slightly bulbous trunk and dense crown. Found scattered on the northern plains.
	<i>Callitris glaucophylla</i>	White Cypress-pine	Straight trunked tree found in woodlands, or granitic outcrops. Slow growing, termite resistant wood.
	<i>Eucalyptus albens</i>	White Box	Tough, attractive shade and shelterbelt tree with blue foliage. Good habitat.
	<i>Eucalyptus behriana</i>	Bull Mallee	Hardy, multi stemmed small tree to 12m high.
	<i>Eucalyptus blakelyi</i>	Blakely's Red Gum	Medium sized tree, locally common on woodlands.
	<i>Eucalyptus camaldulensis</i>	River Red Gum	Large spreading tree for shade, habitat, stream and gully erosion.
	<i>Eucalyptus camphora</i>	Mountain Swamp Gum	Useful for gully erosion and boggy areas. Good habitat.
	<i>Eucalyptus dives</i>	Broad-leaved Peppermint	Good shade and habitat tree. Useful in shelterbelts.
	<i>Eucalyptus globulus ssp. bicostata</i>	Blue Gum	Quick growing large tree for shade, shelter and habitat.
	<i>Eucalyptus goniocalyx</i>	Long Leaf Box	For shade, shelter and general habitat planting.
	<i>Eucalyptus leucoxylon ssp. pruinosa</i>	Yellow Gum	Varies from small to medium tree (up to 25m), smooth bark with long flowering period.
	<i>Eucalyptus macrorhyncha</i>	Red Stringybark	Good revegetation tree, hardy. Keep fenced from stock.
	<i>Eucalyptus melliodora</i>	Yellow Box	Attractive. Variable in form. Habitat, shade and soil stabilisation values.
	<i>Eucalyptus microcarpa</i>	Grey Box	Long lived. Good for habitat, gully erosion and shelter.
	<i>Eucalyptus obliqua</i>	Messmate	Habitat and shelterbelts. Regenerates readily after fire.
	<i>Eucalyptus ovata</i>	Swamp Gum	Plant on creek flats and swampy areas. Good habitat.

	<i>Eucalyptus pauciflora</i>	Snow Gum	Generally occurring above 1000m. Often a crooked, branching trunk, with smooth white and grey bark.
	<i>Eucalyptus polyanthemos</i>	Red Box	Hardy. Useful for shade, shelter and habitat. Medium size tree with blue foliage.
	<i>Eucalyptus polybractea</i>	Blue Mallee	Multi-stemmed small tree with blue grey foliage. Commonly known for its eucalyptus essential oil.
	<i>Eucalyptus radiata</i>	Narrow-leaved Peppermint	Attractive upright tree for shelterbelts and habitat areas.
	<i>Eucalyptus rubida</i>	Candlebark	Excellent habitat tree with hollows. Attractive white/grey/pink bark.
	<i>Eucalyptus tricarpa</i>	Red Ironbark	Hardy, medium sized tree with deeply fissured black bark. Long flowering period.
	<i>Eucalyptus viminalis</i>	Manna Gum	Excellent habitat. Bark sheds in ribbons.
	<i>Eucalyptus viridis</i>	<b>Green Mallee</b>	Small tree to 8m. Rough bark at base with smooth trunk and branches. Compact crown of shiny green leaves. Hardy.

	<i>Acacia acinacea</i>	Gold Dust Wattle	Good habitat and low screen. Responds to browsing. Self seeds.
	<i>Acacia aspera</i>	Rough Wattle	Medium shrub with hairy leaves and pods.
	<i>Acacia flexifolia</i>	Bent-leaf Wattle	Fairly dense, round, small shrub. Isolated populations in Victoria.
	<i>Acacia genistifolia</i>	Spreading Wattle	Fast growing. Open, spreading and prickly. Good bird refuge.
	<i>Acacia gunnii</i>	Ploughshare Wattle	Small, rare wattle. May occur as a ground cover or small shrub.
	<i>Acacia lanigera</i>	Woolly Wattle	Low shelterbelt cover. Early flowering – provides colour in winter.
	<i>Acacia leprosa</i>	Cinnamon Wattle	Variable. Fast growing. Good for habitat and shelterbelts.
	<i>Acacia mitchelli</i>	Mitchell's Wattle	Silver coloured wattle, occurring as a low shrub or ground cover. Locally rare.
	<i>Acacia montana</i>	Mallee Wattle	Dense, rounded, rather sticky green shrub. Mostly found in mallee scrub and box ironbark forest.
	<i>Acacia paradoxa</i>	Hedge Wattle	Prickly. Good for bird habitat and shelterbelts.
	<i>Acacia penninervis</i>	Hickory Wattle	Densely foliated shrub. Isolated population in the Strathbogie Ranges.
	<i>Acacia pravissima</i>	Ovens Wattle	Shrub or small tree found near streams or damp sheltered sites.
	<i>Acacia pycnantha</i>	Golden Wattle	Fast growing. Short lived. Readily self seeds.
	<i>Acacia rubida</i>	Red Stem Wattle	Shelterbelt shrub for hills and mountain areas. Soil binder.
	<i>Acacia verniciflua</i>	Varnish Wattle	Attractive shrub for shelter, erosion control and habitat.
	<i>Bursaria spinosa</i>	Sweet Bursaria	Hardy and adaptable. Prickly. Habitat for birds and butterflies.
	<i>Callistemon sieberi</i>	River Bottlebrush	Hardy streamside shrub. Stabilises banks. Good habitat.
	** <i>Calytrix tetragona</i>	Fringe Myrtle	Erect to spreading shrub 0.5 to 2m. Small aromatic leaves with white to pink flowers. Hardy.
	<i>Cassinia aculeata</i>	Common Cassinia	Fast growing pioneer species. Colonises bare ground. Good shelter and habitat.
	<i>Cassinia arcuata</i>	Drooping Cassinia	Graceful, easily grown shrub. Readily colonises disturbed areas.
	<i>Cassinia longifolia</i>	Shiny Cassinia	Fast growing. Easily established shrub for bare ground, shelter and habitat.
	<i>Cassinia ozothamnoides</i>	Cottony Haeckeria	Small shrub with curry smelling leaves. Profuse and conspicuous flowerheads.
	** <i>Coprosma quadrifida</i>	Prickly Currant-bush	Upright shrub 2-4m. Small olive green leaves with small red berries. Prefers semi-shaded position in moist soil.

	<b>**Correa glabra</b>	Rock Correa	Dense medium sized shrub. Prefers well drained soils, full sun to part shade. Green or red bell shaped flowers.
	<b>**Correa lawrenciana</b>	Mountain Correa	Tall shrub found in taller forests. Bears yellow-green flowers. Honeyeater food source.
	<b>**Correa reflexa</b>	Common Correa	Medium sized shrub – excellent for dry, shady sites. Nectar source for honeyeaters.
	<i>Daviesia benthamii</i>	Spiny Bitter Pea	Dense small shrub with yellow-brown flowers.
	<i>Daviesia latifolia</i>	Hop Bitter Pea	Interesting foliage and flowers. Plant in clumps. Good habitat and shelter.
	<i>Daviesia leptophylla</i>	Narrow Leaved Bitter Pea	Useful in habitat and shelter plantings. Plant in clumps.
	<i>Daviesia ulicifolia</i>	Gorse Bitter Pea	Prickly. Good bird habitat. Attractive pea flowers.
	<i>Dillwynia cinerascens</i>	Grey Parrot Pea	Low attractive shrub for understory plantings on drier sites.
	<i>Dillwynia juniperina</i>	Prickly Parrot Pea	Prickly shrub of 1 – 2 metres. Small yellow and red flowers clustered at the end of branches.
	<i>Dillwynia sericea</i>	Showy Parrot Pea	Good understory plant. Does well under established trees. Showy flowers.
	<i>Dodonaea boroniifolia</i>	Fern-leaf Hop Bush	Spreading, dense shrub. Useful as a low windbreak and very decorative.
	<i>Dodonaea viscosa ssp. angustissima</i>	Slender Hop Bush	Excellent habitat for insects and small birds.
	<i>Dodonaea viscosa ssp. cuneata</i>	Wedge leaf Hop Bush	Erect shrub to 2m. Excellent habitat, ornamental, good low windbreak.
	<i>Eutaxia diffusa</i>	Spreading Eutaxia	Variable shrub to 1.5m. Yellow and purple flowers.
	<i>Eutaxia microphylla</i>	Common Eutaxia	Heath like shrub to 1m. Profuse yellow and red flowers. Good habitat.
	<i>Gompholobium huegelii</i>	Common Wedge-pea	Erect or spreading shrub to 1m. Found naturally in dry sandy to gravelly soils. Pale to bright yellow flowers.
	<b>**Grevillea alpina</b>	Cat's Claw Grevillea	Variable small shrub with attractive red and yellow flowers. Excellent habitat.
	<i>Indigofera australis</i>	Austral Indigo	Attractive mauve flowers. Good habitat.
	<i>Kunzea parvifolia</i>	Violet Kunzea	Erect shrub to 1.5m. Slender wiry reddish branches with small leaves. Pink to purple flowers. Prefers moist soils.
	<i>Leptospermum continentale</i>	Prickly Tea Tree	Likes swampy sites. Excellent plant for habitat and erosion control.
	<i>Leptospermum lanigerum</i>	Woolly Tea Tree	Excellent for habitat, stream and gully erosion. Requires very wet sites.
	<i>Leptospermum obovatum</i>	River Tea Tree	Excellent for habitat, stream and gully erosion. Requires very wet sites.

	<i>Melaleuca parvistaminea</i>	Rough-barked Honey-myrtle	Valuable for riparian habitat. Controls gully erosion. Can form thickets.
	<i>Melicytus dentatus</i>	Tree Violet	Hardy. Useful for habitat and erosion control. Strong floral perfume.
	<i>Mirbelia oxylobioides</i>	Mountain Mirbelia	Spreading, open branched shrub with small leaves. Bright orange/red flowers. Important understorey species.
	** <i>Olearia argophylla</i>	Musk Daisy Bush	Fast growing large shrub with profuse flowers in Spring. Requires sheltered site on deep soils.
	<i>Olearia lirata</i>	Snow Daisy Bush	Soft open shrub to 4m. Requires sheltered site on deep soils.
	<i>Olearia phloggopappa</i>	Dusty Daisy Bush	Spreading shrub to 2m. Leaves green above and greyish-white underneath. White flowers. Requires moist soils.
	<i>Ozothamnus obcordatus</i>	Grey Everlasting	An erect slender shrub with shiny foliage. Hardy. For shelter and habitat.
	** <i>Pimelea axiflora</i>	Bootlace Bush	Shrub to 3m. Opposite narrow leaves, white flowers. Prefers high rainfall moist conditions.
	** <i>Pimelea humilis</i>	Common Rice-flower	Small erect shrub to 0.5m. Creamy white clusters of flowers. Widespread and hardy.
	<i>Pittosporum angustifolium</i>	Weeping Pittosporum	Shrub to small tree (10m). Drooping branches with orange fruit and cream flowers. Prefers sandy well drained soils.
	<i>Pomaderris aspera</i>	Hazel Pomaderris	Large shrub or small tree for stream sides and sheltered, moist sites.
	<i>Pomaderris prunifolia</i>	Prunus Pomaderris	Shrub occurring on rocky sites not far from watercourses. Requires well drained soils and semi shade.
	<i>Prostanthera lasianthos</i>	Victorian Christmas Bush	Attractive large shrub for stream sides and moist gullies.
	<i>Pultenaea daphnoides</i>	Large Leaf Bush Pea	Hardy. Useful for shelterbelts and general understorey planting.
	<i>Pultenaea humilis</i>	Dwarf Bush Pea	Erect to prostrate shrub to 0.2-0.8m. Soft hairy foliage with yellow and red pea flowers.
	<i>Pultenaea largiflorens</i>	Twiggy Bush Pea	Orange red pea flowers. An important component of understorey. Excellent habitat and nitrogen fixing.
	<i>Pultenaea laxiflora</i>	Loose Flower Bush Pea	Low spreading shrub – often prostrate. Orange and red pea flowers.
	<i>Pultenaea pedunculata</i>	Matted Bush-pea	Prostrate, mat forming shrub. Showy yellow pea flowers.
	<i>Pultenaea procumbens</i>	Heathy Bush-pea	Small shrub up to 1m. Orange and red pea flowers. Hardy.
	<i>Pultenaea williamsonii</i>	Highland Bush-pea	Low growing, spreading shrub, often prostrate.
	<i>Senna artemisioides</i> subsp. <i>zygophylla</i>	Narrow Leaf Desert Cassia	Hardy shrub 1 – 3 metres high. Fast growing and short lived. Golden yellow flowers
	<i>Viminaria juncea</i>	Golden Spray	Erect shrub to small tree. Tolerates water-logging. Fast growing. Long drooping yellow sprays.

Number Request	Latin Name	Common Name	Comments
	<i>Acacia aculeatissima</i>	Thin Leaf Wattle	Hardy prostrate or low sprawling shrub.
	** <i>Billardiera scandens</i>	Common Apple-berry	Shrubby climber or scrambler. Cream to greenish-yellow tubular flowers later becoming green fleshy fruits, both beneficial for birds.
	<i>Bossiaea prostrata</i>	Creeping Bossiaea	Fine, delicate prostrate pea with yellow and red pea flowers. Nitrogen fixing.
	<i>Chenopodium desertorum</i> <i>ssp. microphyllum</i>	Frosted Goosefoot	Small shrub about 30cm high. Useful forage plant which is moderately acceptable to stock.
	<i>Clematis aristata</i>	Mountain Clematis	Vigorous woody climber to 6m high. Prolific white attractive flowers. Prefers moist or sheltered sites.
	<i>Clematis microphylla</i>	Small-leaved Clematis	Woody, twining climber to 5m high. Cream flowers with showy 'fluffy' seedheads. Dry sandy sites.
	<i>Einadia hastata</i>	Saloop	Neat, rounded, perennial small shrub. Relatively palatable forage for stock. Food plant for caterpillars. Salt tolerant. Hardy.
	<i>Einadia nutans</i>	Nodding Saltbush	Herbaceous perennial with trailing branches. Palatable forage plant. Salinity tolerant. Food plant for caterpillars. Hardy.
	<i>Enchylaena tomentosa</i>	Ruby Saltbush	Prostrate, spreading or erect shrub to 1.5m. Green to bluish, hairy, succulent leaves with bright pink edible berries. Hardy.
	<i>Glycine clandestina</i>	Twining Glycine	Slender, light climber. Hardy once established.
	<i>Glycine tabacina</i>	Variable Glycine	Small, delicate scrambler or climber. Blue to mauve flowers. Good habitat for butterfly caterpillars. Nitrogen fixing.
	<i>Hardenbergia violacea</i>	Happy Wanderer, Purple Coral Pea	Climbing or prostrate scrambler. Showy purple pea flowers. Good habitat.
	<i>Kennedia prostrata</i>	Running Postman	Trailing or matted perennial. Scarlet pea flowers. Good habitat.
	<i>Platylobium formosum</i>	Handsome Flat-Pea	Trailing, prostrate, scrambling shrub with yellow and red flowers. Likes shade, fertile soils. Good habitat and nitrogen fixing.
	<i>Platylobium montanum</i>	Mountain Flat-Pea	Trailing, prostrate, scrambling shrub. Likes shade, high rainfall sites. Good habitat and nitrogen fixing.
	** <i>Templetonia stenophylla</i>	Leafy Templetonia	Small, straggling shrub with small cream flowers. Nitrogen fixing.
	** <i>Tetradthea ciliata</i>	Pink-bells	Slender clumping shrub to 1m. Attractive deep pink-lilac flowers. Moist to dryish soils, full sun to part shade.
	** <i>Veronica plebeia</i>	Trailing Speedwell	Creeping perennial herb, rooting at leaf nodes. Small violet flowers. Well drained soils, hardy.
	** <i>Veronica perfoliata</i>	Diggers Speedwell	Low growing shrub with an arching habit, grows to 0.3 – 1m in height. Pale grey foliage with attractive sprays of pale mauve flowers. Hardy.

	<i>**Ajuga australis</i>	Austral Bugle	Small herb with rosette leaves. Blue violet flowering stem.
	<i>Arthropodium fimbriatum</i>	Nodding Chocolate-lily	Tufted perennial herb with mauve or purple fragrant flowers. Plant in groups.
	<i>Arthropodium minus</i>	Small Vanilla-lily	Tufted perennial herb. Plant in groups.
	<i>Arthropodium strictum</i>	Chocolate Lily	Tufted perennial herb. Attractive flowers on long stems.
	<i>Brachyscome basaltica</i>	Swamp Daisy	Perennial herb with white flowers. Grows well in damp positions. Butterfly food.
	<i>Brunonia australis</i>	Blue Pincushion	Perennial herb with a small rosette of soft leaves. Striking deep blue pincushion shaped flowers.
	<i>Bulbine bulbosa</i>	Bulbine Lily	Tufted succulent perennial herb. Bright yellow flowers growing along main stalk. Plant in groups – will spread. Common and widespread.
	<i>Bulbine glauca</i>	Rock Lily	Tufted succulent perennial herb. Bright yellow flowers growing along main stalk. Plant in groups – will spread. Grows on rocky granitic sites.
	<i>Burchardia umbellata</i>	Early Nancy	Tufted succulent perennial herb. White with a dark brown line. Plant in groups.
	<i>Calocephalus citreus</i>	Lemon Beauty-heads	Erect perennial daisy. Long, bright yellow flower heads.
	<i>Chieranthera cyanea</i>	Blue Finger Flower	Small shrub with deep blue flowers.
	<i>Chrysocephalum apiculatum</i>	Common Everlasting	Variable, dense spreading, perennial herb. Long flowering. Soil binder.
	<i>Chrysocephalum semipapposum</i>	Clustered Everlasting	Variable in form. Long flowering with yellow flower clusters.
	<i>Convolvulus erubescens</i>	Pink Bindweed	Perennial with trailing or twining stems. Pink flowers through Spring and summer.
	<i>Coronidium scorpioides</i>	Button Everlasting	Woolly perennial herb with yellow flowers. Spreads easily.
	<i>Craspedia variabilis</i>	Billy Buttons	Erect herb with golden yellow flowers in globular heads.
	<i>Desmodium varians</i>	Slender Tick-trefoil	Perennial creeper – nitrogen fixing.
	<i>Dianella admixta</i>	Black-anther Flax-lily	Tufted perennial herb to 1m, forming mats with fibrous roots. Dark blue or violet flowers with black anthers.
	<i>Dianella longifolia</i>	Pale Flax-lily	Tufted perennial herb to 1m. Dark blue flowers on tall stems.
	<i>Dianella tasmanica</i>	Tasman Flax-lily	Robust tufting perennial with broad strap leaves. Prefers moist, shady sites.
	<i>Eryngium ovinum</i>	Blue Devil	Erect perennial herb with showy, metallic blue-purple flowers, surrounded by spiny bracts.
	<i>Isotoma axillaris</i>	Rock Isotome	Small, bushy perennial herb. Showy star-shaped flowers.
	<i>Leptohynchos squamatus</i>	Scaly Buttons	Small, perennial herb, often with hairy stems. Small, yellow button flowers.

	<i>Leucochrysum albicans</i>	Hoary Sunray	Small everlasting yellow flower. Very pretty. Flowers early in Spring.
	<i>Linum marginale</i>	Native Flax	Slender, low upright perennial with blue flowers. Plant several together.
	<i>Microseris scapigera</i>	Yam Daisy	Dandelion looking plant. Major food source for Aboriginals.
	<i>Minuria leptophylla</i>	Minnie Daisy	Perennial herb to 0.5m, with white daisy flowers. Well drained soils, hardy.
	<i>Pelargonium australe</i>	Austral Stork's Bill	Clump forming perennial herb, may die back in hot weather. White/pink flowers with purple markings
	<i>Pycnosaurus globosus</i>	Drumsticks	Erect, perennial herb with long, woolly flowering stems. Flowers are a bright yellow, globular head.
	<i>Rhodanthe anthemoides</i>	Chamomile Sunray	Erect bushy herb with white paper daisy flowers. Prefers sandy, well drained soils.
	<i>Rhodanthe corymbiflora</i>	Paper Sunray	Erect, annual herb with grey foliage. White paper daisy flowers. Prefers well drained, moist soils.
	<i>Stylidium graminifolium</i>	Grass Trigger Flower	Tufted perennial with narrow leaves and spikes of pink flowers. Plant in clumps.
	** <i>Stypandra glauca</i>	Nodding Blue Lily	Tufted or shrubby perennial herb found in forest and woodland. Bright blue flowers.
	<i>Velleia paradoxa</i>	Spur Velleia	Short-lived perennial herb with a rosette of leaves and open heads of yellow flowers.
	<i>Vittadinia cuneata</i>	Fuzzy New Holland Daisy	Woody, annual or perennial herb with mauve flowers. Widespread in dry areas, hardy.
	<i>Wahlenbergia stricta</i>	Tall Bluebell	Widespread, perennial tufted herb. Blue flowers mostly between Oct – Jan.
	<i>Xerochrysum viscosum</i>	Sticky Everlasting	Showy, long lasting yellow flowers. Good for butterflies. Regenerates after fire. Hardy.

	<i>Aristida behriana</i>	Brush Wire-grass	Tufted perennial found in drier areas. Seeds have three awns.
	<i>Aristida ramosa</i>	Purple Wire-grass	Tufted perennial preferring drier, rocky sites. Seeds have three awns.
	<i>Austrostipa densiflora</i>	Dense Spear Grass	Coarsely tufted perennial grass up to 1m high. Good habitat. Sharp awns.
	<i>Austrostipa elegantissima</i>	Feather Spear Grass	Coarsely tufted perennial grass up to 1m high. Good habitat. Sharp awns
	<i>Dichelachne hirtella</i>	Plume Grass	Erect flowerhead with thickly packed spikelets. Found in dry, often rocky country.
	<i>Elymus scaber</i>	Common Wheat Grass	Loosely tufted perennial grass. High forage value. Food plant for caterpillars of native butterflies and moths.
	<i>Lomandra filiformis</i>	Wattle Mat Rush	Hardy, low tufting perennial. Often persists in rough paddocks.
	<i>Lomandra longifolia</i>	Spiny Headed Mat Rush	Tough, large tussocky perennial. Good habitat for ground fauna. Prefers moist sites.
	<i>Microleana stipoides</i>	Weeping Grass	Tufted, slender perennial grass. Green all year. Great low maintenance native lawn.
	<i>Poa labillardieri</i>	Common Tussock Grass	Widespread along creek banks and alluvial flats. Tussocks are up to 1m in size.
	<i>Poa sieberiana</i>	Grey Tussock Grass	Widespread in a variety of habitats. Useful habitat for small birds and reptiles.
	<i>Rytidosperma caespitosum</i>	Common Wallaby Grass	Tufted perennial grass with fine leaves and fluffy seedheads. Important component of native pastures.
	<i>Rytidosperma pallidum</i> , (formerly known as <i>Joycea palliada</i> )	Red Anther Wallaby Grass	Robust, coarse, perennial tussock. Attractive red anther flowers. Prefers part shade, hardy once established.
	<i>Themeda triandra</i>	Kangaroo Grass	Tufted, perennial, deep rooted grass often tipped red. Moderate forage value. Useful 'green pick' during summer after rain.

	<i>Alisma plantago-aquatica</i>	Common Water Plantain	Perennial herb with large leaves to 0.5m. Small white flowers on spike up to 1.2m. Grows in shallow water, can die back in cooler months.
	<i>Amphibromus nervosus</i>	Common Swamp Wallaby Grass	Tufted perennial grass with a graceful weeping habit, up to 1.2m. Ideal around dams and swamps..
	<i>Carex appressa</i>	Tall Sedge	Perennial bright green tufted plant to 1m with flowers spikes up to 1.2m. Prefers boggy conditions all year around. Use for erosion control.

	<i>Carex fascicularis</i>	Tassel Sedge	Perennial bright green tufted plant with attractive fluffy seed heads to 1m. Prefers wet conditions all year round.
	<i>Carex inversa</i>	Knob Sedge	Perennial, dense tufting habit to 0.2m. Tolerates full sun, inundation and periodic dry periods.
	<i>Carex tereticaulis</i>	Rush Sedge	Perennial green tufted plant to 0.6m with flower spikes to 1.2m. Use for erosion control, prefers seasonally inundated wet conditions.
	<i>Cyperus exaltatus</i>	Flat Sedge	Robust, tussock sedge. Useful plant around wetlands and dams.
	<i>Lomandra longifolia</i>	Spiny Headed Mat Rush	Tough, large tussocky perennial. Good habitat for ground fauna. Prefers moist sites.
	<i>Lythrum salicaria</i>	Purple Loosestrife	Annual shrub with purple – pink flowers. Likes damp or flooded sites.
	<i>Myrophyllum sp.</i>	Milfoil	Small emergent wetland herb with feathery stems. Grows well in among wetland rushes, requires shallow seasonal water.
	<i>Persicaria hydropiper</i>	Water Pepper	Slender, annual herb to 1 metre. Common in damp spots, along creek banks and rivers.
	<i>Phragmites australis</i>	Common Reed	Semi-aquatic, bamboo-like perennial grass up to 4m high. Prefers fresh or brackish water up to 2m depth. Excellent for erosion control.
	<i>Poa labillardieri</i>	Common Tussock Grass	Widespread along creek banks and alluvial flats. Tussocks are up to 1m in size.
	<i>Triglochin procerum</i>	Water Ribbons	Long strappy leaves emerging from the water. Green flower spikes up to 70cm tall but often a lot smaller. Requires seasonal water.
